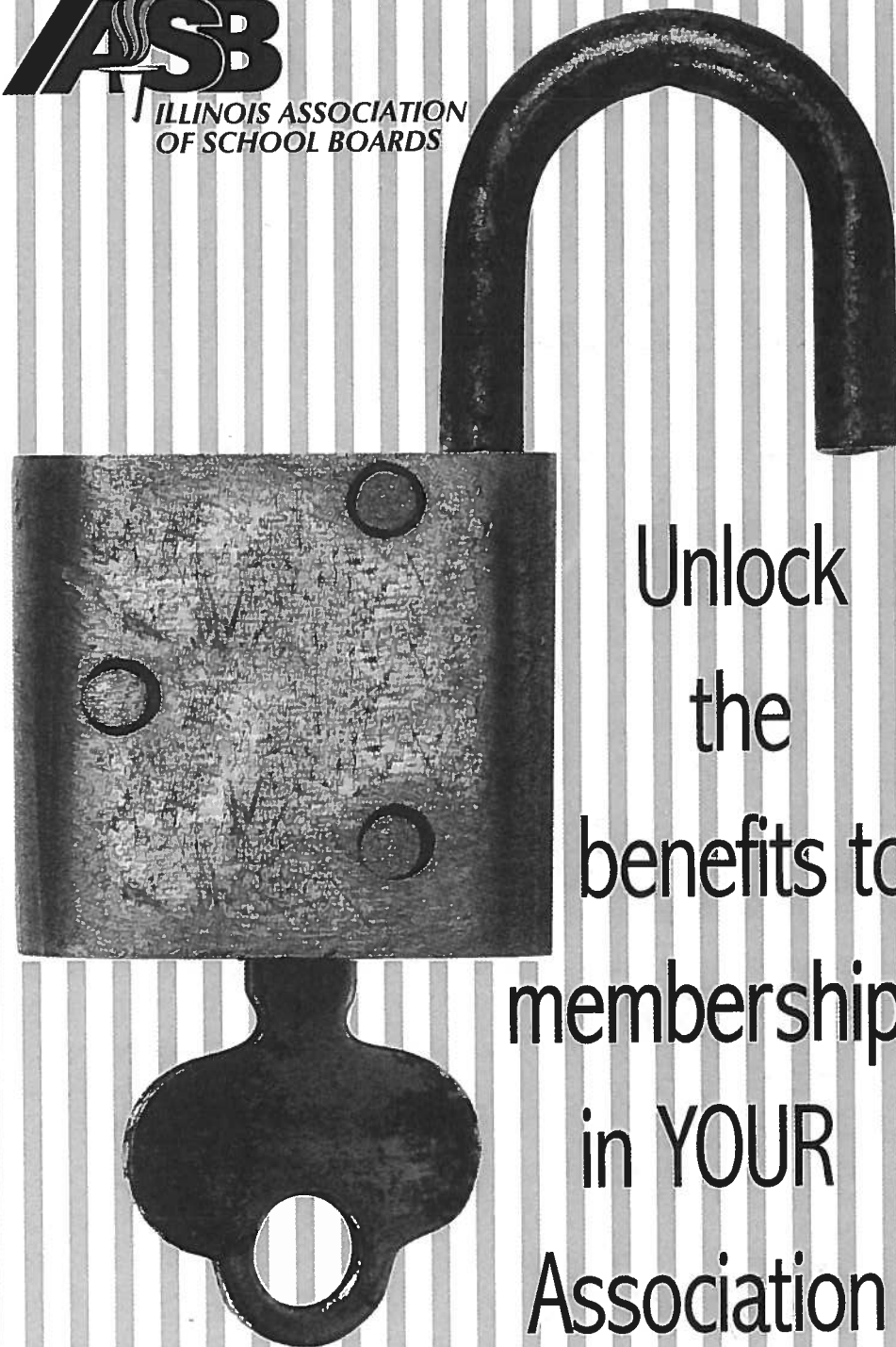

# Who we are

The Illinois Association of School Boards is a voluntary organization of local boards of education dedicated to strengthening the public schools through local citizen control. Although not a part of state government, IASB is organized by member school boards as a private not-for-profit corporation under authority granted by Article 23 of The Illinois School Code.

The mission of the Illinois Association of School Boards is excellence in local school governance in support of quality public education.

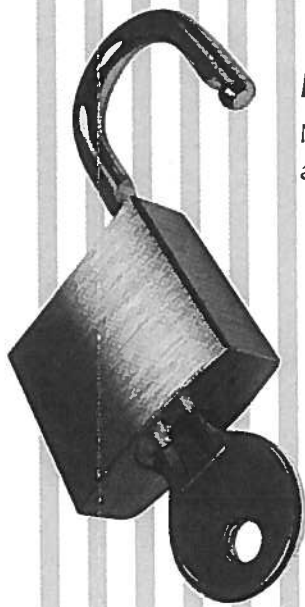
The Association's constitution provides that major policies be established by an annual Delegate Assembly and places governance in the hands of an elected board of directors. The board of directors, made up of officers and regional directors, employs an executive director who is directed by board policy and the board-approved annual budget to carry out the work of the Association through offices in Springfield and Lombard.

Programs designed to provide leadership, service and advocacy for local school boards fall mainly into four broad categories:

- Professional development programs providing school board and superintendent governance teams and individual school board members opportunities to increase their knowledge and skills and to earn credit towards the mandatory school board member training provisions in State law;
- Governmental relations programs for representing the needs and views of member school boards before the Illinois General Assembly, the Illinois State Board of Education, and the United States Congress;
- Direct services that range from in-district workshops including board self-evaluations to sessions on the board's role in providing leadership for student learning; from executive searches to board policy and administrative procedures development, updating and maintenance;
- Information services consisting of research, publishing and media relations.

The Association also engages in a variety of governance, leadership and public relations activities and is a federation member of the National School Boards Association. IASB offers a number of fee-supported services and sponsors several risk management programs that are governed by and for participating school districts.

Membership is also extended by invitation to affiliates (educational service agencies), associates (retired school board members), service associates (school vendors), school attorneys and township and county school treasurers.

## Member services

Many member services are provided at central and regional sites statewide, but they can also be tailored for delivery to individual districts and boards. Among the services

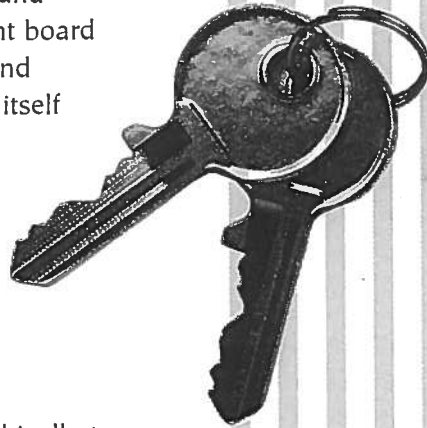
## Statewide leadership

Dedicated to the principles of local citizen leadership, IASB pursues its mission of excellence in local school governance in support of quality public education. IASB encourages member boards to pursue excellence in governance by articulating their district's mission, vision and goals in board-adopted policy; connecting with the community; hiring a superintendent and delegating responsibility to implement board policy; monitoring district progress and compliance with policy; and holding itself accountable.

IASB also seeks public understanding and support for the important role of the school board. Through the Association's governance and representation process, that support is generated in the following ways:

Each district is assigned geographically to one of 21 regional divisions. Board members are encouraged to participate in Association governance by serving as division directors, division chairs, resolution chairs, governing board representatives or other key positions. Each division elects a local school board member to serve on the Association's board of directors.

Each district gets a vote in the annual Delegate Assembly and has the opportunity to submit resolutions to this group to help the Association propose or oppose critical legislative or regulatory issues. Association positions taken on legislation in the Capitol come directly from the membership via the Delegate Assembly process.



# What you get

School board members in IASB member districts receive all Association periodicals, including *The Illinois School Board Journal* and the *Illinois School Board Newsbulletin*, as well as announcements, annual publications, legislative reports, and more in web postings and other mailings.

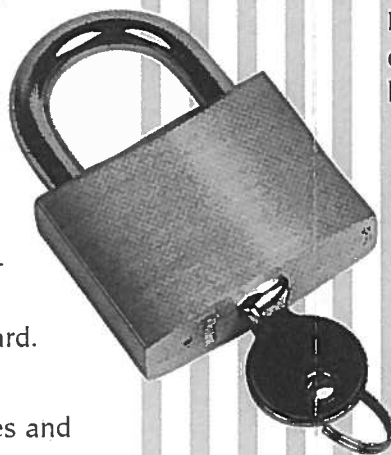
You can consult with IASB staff when you need information — by mail, telephone, email, or in a personal visit to the Association offices in Springfield or Lombard.

You are invited to participate in regional workshops, division dinner meetings, online learning opportunities and the annual conference on school board leadership. Your attendance and participation in these leadership activities and personal professional development opportunities also earn credits toward statewide recognition programs and may count towards credit and compliance with the State mandatory school board member training provisions.

You can purchase books, CDs and DVDs from the Association bookstore at member prices. These titles include school law, finance, governance, operations and maintenance, leadership, communication, collective bargaining, student achievement, student discipline, and more.

School board members, superintendents and board secretaries of member school districts also have access to the Association's Members-Only website. This is where you can track leadership points and course credits, participate in on-line surveys, prepare a personal schedule for and download handouts from the annual conference, and much more.

Most importantly, your active involvement in IASB will help you build important and lasting relationships with hundreds of other elected school board members.



# What your district gets

Benefits available to member school districts include access to the expertise of field services staff who are available to meet in your district with your board and superintendent governance team to facilitate board self-evaluations and to provide assistance with goal setting, team building, board-superintendent relations, superintendent evaluation processes, effective meetings, and other customized workshops.

## Member districts can also:

- contract for or subscribe to various policy services, including policy manual development, updating and maintenance; administrative procedures manual development; web-publishing local school board policy manuals; electronic board meeting agenda and packet preparation and distribution; in-district workshops on policy processes or content.
- receive training, coaching and assistance for providing board leadership for improved student learning and achievement.
- contract with IASB to conduct executive searches for superintendents and other administrative staff.
- submit and present panel sessions at IASB's annual conference.
- be represented in the State Capitol each legislative session day by a team of legislative specialists advocating for local school board interests.
- have automatic representation in the National School Boards Association, and are invited to become a National Affiliate Member, and to attend NSBA's annual conference.
- Access the IASB Resource Center, including its library reference service, databases, surveys, and education-related research.
- Access to programs designed to save money or ensure competitive pricing of essential services. These sponsored programs are offered to districts through pooling or trust arrangements, often governed by the districts themselves. They include cost-containment programs for funding workers' compensation risks, controlling unemployment claims and liability/casualty insurance; low-cost programs for investing school funds; buying electricity and natural gas; filing Medicaid reimbursement claims; and drug and alcohol testing for school bus drivers.



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
